NI's First Carbon Literacy Programmes Aim To Educate On Climate Change As 75% Of Teachers Welcome Guidance

Keep Northern Ireland Beautiful (KNIB) is encouraging schools, community groups, teachers and youth leaders across Northern Ireland to participate in new Carbon Literacy programmes.

The initiative, which is funded



by the Department of Agriculture, Environment and Rural Affairs (DAERA) and delivered by KNIB, aims to inform teachers, youth leaders and young people about the challenges of climate change and how they can become part of the solution. Teachers who participate in the training will also be well placed to deliver a new Open College Network accredited GCSE titled 'Reducing Carbon Footprints Through Environmental Action'. Research has shown that 75% of teachers feel ill-equipped to educate students about climate change, while 69% of teachers feel there should be more teaching about climate change in schools. Meanwhile 68% of pupils want to learn more about the subject. The Carbon Literacy training is designed to build confidence, knowledge, skills and motivation to empower individuals and organisations to respond to the climate crisis. KNIB aims to help embed Carbon Literacy education into schools across Northern Ireland, to change lifestyles and promote behaviour that leads to positive, individual action in reducing carbon emissions. The programmes, which include 'Carbon Literacy for Teachers,' 'Carbon Smart Students,' 'Carbon Literacy for Youth Leaders,' and 'Carbon Smart Youth Groups,' will deliver targeted training to teachers, youth leaders and young people in a variety of settings. The Carbon Literacy Programmes are delivered in partnership with the registered charity, the Carbon Literacy Trust, which was founded in 2009 and operates in 14 countries worldwide. We all want to treat our mums for Mother's Day, and what better way to do that than with some sweet treats. These tasty blondies have been created by Great British Bake Off quarter finalist, Lizzie Acker. The recipe for the vanilla-based blondies is easy and great fun for kids to make. So grab your apron and get baking!

LIZZIE'S MOTHER'S DAY BLONDIES

20 minutes prep, 30 minutes to cook, serves 8-10.



YOU WILL NEED:

180g unsalted butter, 150g light brown sugar, 150g dark brown sugar, 2 eggs, 3 tsp Nielsen-Massey Vanilla Extract, pinch of salt, 250g plain flour, ½ tsp baking powder, 200g white chocolate chips

FOR THE DECORATION:

200g white chocolate, pink gel food colouring (or any colour), sprinkles/freeze dried fruit

METHOD:

- 1: Preheat the oven to 180°c
- 2: Place the butter in a pan and cook until it starts to simmer and slightly browns
- 3: In a bowl place the light and dark brown sugars, vanilla extract, and pinch of salt and mix
- 4: Once the butter has browned, pour into the bowl with the sugar ingredients and stir to mix, then allow to cool slightly
- 5: Mix the eggs into the sugar and butter mixture
- 6: Fold the flour and baking powder into the mixture until there are no more pockets of flour visible
- 7: Mix in the chocolate chips
- 8: Put into an 8-inch square lined tin and place in the oven for 30 minutes
- $9{:}$ After 30 minutes take out of the oven and allow to cool
- 10: Meanwhile melt the 200g of white chocolate and add the food colouring
- 11: Allow to cool slightly and then add to the piping bag
- 12: Pipe on your messages and decorations before the blondie sets. You can decorate with sprinkles, edible glitter, or freeze-dried fruit, it's completely up to you!
- 13: Cut the blondie into square shaped individual portions to eat with your mum on Mother's Day



Family Support

It's a question many parents face when they are returning to work, be it part-time or full time - what type of childcare would best suit me? What childcare setting you choose depends on your circumstances and what is available in your area. There is a variety of childcare options out there - as the latest in our FSNI columns explains here.

There are various types of childcare, with some perhaps being more suited to your needs and the needs of your children. Registered childcare settings are listed on www.familysupportni.gov.uk and are registered and inspected by Early Years Team to ensure they are maintaining the registration requirements of the Children (NI) Order 1995.

Approved Home Childcare enables parents to have their children cared for in the child's own home.

Registered childminders are self-employed daycare providers who work in their own home to provide care and education for other people's children.

Creche facilities provide a time-limited daycare option for parents/carers of young children and are mostly used by parents/carers attending education courses or other training.

Day nurseries provide full daycare for children aged from six weeks to compulsory school age. Rooms are divided up by the different age groups,

Out of school care can be a breakfast club, an after-school club or a school day, for primary school aged children (4-12 years). Full day care may also be provided during school closures and holidays.

A pre-school playgroup provides early year's education and care for children up to four hours a day, usually five days per week. Pre-school

Statutory nursery school/units are inspected by the Education and Department's website www.etini.gov.uk.

A 2 Year Old Programme (2YOP) is a group-based programme, almost exclusively delivered by Sure Starts, consisting of a maximum of 12

This Mother's Day - after you've enjoyed breakfast in bed of course - why not enjoy a fun family day of making together? Whether you fancy a bit of messy play, some mindful makes or making your own game, we have some crafty ideas to make memories with your little ones.

FIZZY CLOUD DOUGH EXPERIMENT

Messy play is a great sensory experience for your kids. Let's face it - it's great fun for the adults too!

What you need:

- 1 cup of flour
- 1 cup of baking soda
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- Oil-based or powder food colouring
- Vinegar
- A mixing bowl
- A tub for playing in

Mix together the flour, baking soda, oil and food colouring in a mixing bowl until you have a dry doughy type consistency. This is your cloud dough! Let your kids explore the texture by moulding and shaping it. Then the real fun comes with the fizz! Try using a dropper or squirt bottle to add different amounts to see what it does to your dough.



NATURE MANDALAS

A mandala is a circular artwork featuring symmetrical geometric designs. The creation of mandalas have traditionally been a meditative, contemplative practice.

What you need:

- A round base (try paper plates or cut circles from cardboard)
- Selection of natural items
- Something to section up your designs e.g. wool, lolly sticks

Begin by collecting natural materials - pebbles, sticks, leaves, shells and flower petals all work beautifully.

Time to get creative! It's more important to enjoy the process than to get it 'right'.

BLOW SKIING

If your family loves to play together, why not make your own game? What you need:

- Cocktail sticks or toothpicks
- Coloured paper
- Glue stick
- Playdough or sticky tack
- To play: a small, light ball (or round sweet) and drinking straws

To make the flags, fold a strip of paper about 4cm (1 1/2 inches) wide in half. Cut triangles along the length of paper so they have a straight edge on the fold and open into diamonds. Glue the two layers of each triangle together

with a cocktail stick in the fold.

To play:

- Set up the course by standing up the flags in blobs of playdough or sticky tack. Arrange them in pairs to form "aates".
- Blow the ball from one side of the table to another, passing through as many gates as possible!



An Inspiring Spire!

Cathédrale Notre-Dame de Paris opened in 1345 and has been an iconic part of the French capital since then. On 15th April 2019 a fire broke out beneath the roof of the cathedral. By the time the fire was extinguished, the building's spire had collapsed and most of its roof destroyed. The copper rooster which sat on top of the spire was one of the culturally-important artefacts that was salvaged.

The construction of Notre-Dame

Begun in 1163, the construction of Notre-Dame continued into the 14th century. Scaffolding stood for decades, serving the comings and goings of master stonemasons, artisans and sculptors who worked away at gargoyles, stained glass windows and flying buttresses. By the 1800s, Notre-Dame had become truly dilapidated. Questions about its restoration had to be raised.

History of a spire

It was during the 19th-century restoration when Viollet-le-Duc designed a spire that rose 305 feet (93 metres) above ground to replace the previous bell tower, which had to be dismantled for fear of collapse. The spire was covered in lead plates to protect its oak framework and decorated with copper sculptures. These images represented the 12 apostles (or followers of Jesus during his lifetime) and the four evangelists (who, according to tradition, wrote

the four gospels that tell Jesus' story). In the figure of apostle St Thomas, the sculptor used Violletle-Duc's own face as a model! This iconic spire would collapse from the fire at Notre-Dame in April



New restoration after the fire of **April 2019**

Notre-Dame's restoration project has started and should take until at least 2024 to complete. An enormous undertaking, the building first has to be strengthened and stabilised and the debris removed. Then, the church will need to be rebuilt in several ways: artistically, architecturally, historically and

symbolically. This process will bring together many specialists, such as stonemasons, master stained glass makers, and restoration experts for the artwork and for the organ and other musical instruments.

The rooster is saved!

Having been found in the rubble the following evening, the rooster was only dented. And he was not the only one to be saved. The sculptures in the spire had been taken away for restoration four days before the fire. A true miracle!

Why do we often find images of roosters at the top of churches and bell towers?

The rooster has towered above churches in Western countries (not just in France) since the Middle Ages. This image is, of course, symbolic. The rooster crows at daybreak, a time when darkness fades. For Christians, it represents the victory of life over death and the triumph of good over the demons of night. The rooster also watches over his flock, so to speak, to warn of danger, symbolising the vigilance of people who watch over others.

Steve Backshall is one of television's best-known wildlife presenters, naturalists and adventurers. INTERVIEW BY CAROLINE RAINEY

Describe yourself in five words.

Enthusiastic, ambitious, workaholic, thoughtful and excitable.

When did you become passionate about wildlife and conservation? What would you say was the driving force behind it?

I've always been this way. My mum and dad tell stories of me going through the compost heap looking for snakes' eggs and worms when I was a toddler! The driving force was just my nature I guess!

What has been your favourite expedition so far?

My favourite expedition was to Borneo where we discovered in a forgotten cave system, prehistoric hand prints maybe 50,000 years old - it was so special placing our hands in the same place that people had done all that time ago. It really put a chill up your spine.

A lot of our readers will know you from Deadly 60 – how important is it to encourage young children about wildlife and conservation?

To introduce young people to the wild world and nature is everything. I know from personal experience how much they have to gain and perhaps how much they have to lose from not being outdoors and active. An even more important question, is that young people who are inspired today, will be the conservation heroes of tomorrow.

This year's Earth Day theme is 'Invest in our Planet' – how would you encourage children to become involved?

Young people today are far more aware about conservation and the environment than anyone in my generation ever was. I would say get involved with a local wildlife charity, go out and get your hands dirty!

Are you excited to get back touring after two years of a hiatus? Can you tell us a bit about the show?

It's been such a long time since I've toured in the UK, but I've done lots of touring in Asia and Australia. Much of the material on the tour I've done many times on stage before, and the audiences have loved it. I can't wait to see how a British audience responds! The big challenge is bringing the ocean to life on stage. We will have life-size models of the largest marine creatures ever known to have lived, real-life science experiments, lots of amazing footage and interactivity with the audience.

HEALTH UPDATE

SPRING HAS SPRUNG, SO BEWARE OF THE POLLEN



There are three types of pollen that people are allergic to tree pollen, grass pollen and weed pollen. They produce light, fine pollen which is carried from one plant to another by the wind. It may seem that you can get hay fever later in the year than you thought and this comes down to the type of pollen you're allergic to.

Hay fever season:

TREE POLLEN: LATE MARCH – MID-MAY GRASS POLLEN: MID-MAY – JULY WEED POLLEN: LATE JUNE – SEPTEMBER

FINDING RELIEF FROM HAY FEVER

This can sometimes feel like an impossible task! But there are some effective ways to help reduce the impact pollen has, for example change your clothes when you get inside. Pollen can stick to your clothes, so this might explain why you're still sneezing after you get home.

Also, washing your clothes will get rid of pollen, but drying them outside could result in new pollen sticking to them. So if you can, dry your clothes inside.

When you are out and about there are still ways to reduce your risk of hay fever. Wearing a pair of sunglasses can help shield your eyes, if itchy eyes are one of your hay fever symptoms. Additionally, put Vaseline around your nostrils to trap pollen and while at home vacuum regularly and dust with a damp cloth.

If you start each day with a cup of tea, there are some options here that could help you manage your hay fever. Teas such as chamomile or nettle tea have antihistamine and anti-inflammatory properties. Indeed, there are some foods that encourage your body to release histamine and make your hay fever worse, for example cheese, nuts and cured and smoked meat. So it is best to avoid these, especially if you know they make your symptoms worse.

CHOOSING AN EFFECTIVE TREATMENT

Ultimately, you will want something that will give quick and more immediate relief from your hay fever and most commonly, people reach for medication. Antihistamines are the most common treatment and you can take them during the hay fever season to stop symptoms before they start.

If you're suffering from a blocked nose, you may be able to get a nasal spray – but make sure to choose the correct spray for you. For those sufferers whose eyes are affected more, eye drops can help. They contain antihistamines and can provide relief from itchy eyes, redness and watering.

CONJUNCTIVITIS

Conjunctivitis is a common problem in children. It occurs when the clear surface covering the white of the eye becomes inflamed, either due to infection, allergy or irritation. Symptoms include red eyes and a watery discharge.

The eyes may feel 'gritty' and the eyelashes can have a sticky coating, particularly first thing in the morning. Conjunctivitis can affect one eye at first but usually it quickly spreads to both eyes. Symptoms can last from 2 days to 3 weeks. The treatment for conjunctivitis depends on the cause. It usually gets better without any treatment within a week or two. Infective conjunctivitis can be caused by a virus or bacteria and is very contagious. It can be difficult to distinguish between a viral and bacterial eye infection. In adults, the cause is often viral – this usually produces a watery discharge and should clear up within a week. While in children the cause tends to be bacterial – the discharge is usually thicker and might require antibiotic treatment. Eye drops containing the antibiotic chloramphenicol (e.g. Optrex Infected Eye Drops) are available over the counter to treat bacterial conjunctivitis. They can be used from two years old. The product should be used for five days and, as with any antibiotic, it is important to complete the course. It's worth noting that antibiotic drops don't work against viral conjunctivitis. Treatment of this condition is usually limited to

alleviating symptoms such as itchy, red eyes with vasoconstrictor, decongestant or antihistamine eye drops, such as Otrivine Antistin, although they are only suitable for ages 12 and over. You can help relieve the symptoms of conjunctivitis by gently clearing away the discharge from the eye with a cotton ball soaked in warm water. Clean in one direction only, moving the cotton ball from the inside to the outside of the eye. Use a separate cotton wool ball for each eye. You can also set a cold, wet and clean cloth over closed eyes to relieve irritation and swelling. Good hygiene can help prevent the spread of conjunctivitis. Washing your hands regularly and not sharing pillows or towels will help prevent it spreading. Try to discourage your child from rubbing their eyes. You don't need to stay away from work or school if you or your child has conjunctivitis, unless you (or they) are feeling particularly unwell. If there are a number of conjunctivitis cases at your child's school or nursery, you could consider keeping them away until their infection has cleared up.

ALL ABOUT PHONICS!

using phonics. This isn't a new concept, but in the past, phonics has been used in combination with other teaching methods.

Children learn letter sounds (phonemes) in groups and then work on blending them to make words. The first group is normally 's, a, t, p, i, n'. Once children know these phonemes, they will be encouraged to blend them together to make words, such as 's - i - t'



Later, children learn that one phoneme can be represented by different letters, such as the sound in the middle of 'rain' can also be represented as 'ay' (play) and 'a-e' (tale).

After learning the first few phonemes, children can start to read. There are a number of fully decodable reading schemes available, such as Phonics Bug, Red Squirrel Phonics, Big Cat Phonics, Floppy's Phonics. These books are carefully written so that children can sound out the words using only their phonic knowledge.

The dos and don'ts when it comes to breastfeeding and diet

The food and drink you consume when you're breastfeeding can impact various things, from your milk supply to your energy levels. Because of this, it's important that you fuel your body with the right nutrients for both you and baby. There are many common questions around breastfeeding and diet, which include foods you should consume and what foods are best to avoid. Breastfeeding experts, Lansinoh stress that you don't need to take in lots of extra calories while breastfeeding but make sure you have a healthy, balanced, nutritious diet.

DO YOU NEED EXTRA FLUID WHEN YOU'RE BREASTFEEDING?

As a general rule, it is recommended that you consume an addition of 300-400 calories per day to ensure you have enough energy to produce milk.

If you notice your breastmilk production decreasing, as well as tiredness and dark coloured urine, this is a sign of dehydration. Breastfeeding women can often feel thirsty and dehydrated due to the production of breastmilk, so make sure you drink enough fluids - water, milk and unsweetened fruit juice are good options. Also, you should always ensure you have a drink to hand when you settle down to feed baby. Drink to satisfy your thirst, but don't overdo it - there is no proven link between fluid intake and milk supply.

WHAT FOODS ARE RECOMMENDED TO EAT WHILE BREASTFEEDING?

Eating a balanced diet is important for the health of you and your baby and eating healthy, nutritious foods now will help your baby be more open to them when they start on complimentary

foods after 6 months. Eating smaller meals more frequently is a good rule to follow, especially if you are experiencing heartburn. Some recommended foods to eat when breastfeeding include:

At least five portions of fruit and vegetables daily Protein foods, such as fish, poultry, eggs, soy and legumes. Plenty of carbohydrates (bread, rice, pasta, potatoes, cereals). Milk and other dairy products for calcium. Green leafy vegetables, meat and legumes for iron

WHAT NUTRIENTS DO YOU NEED WHILE BREASTFEEDING?

As a breastfeeding mum there are a few nutrients that are key to ensure you're incorporating into your diet. DHA: Docosahexaenoic Acid (DHA) is the most abundant omega-3 fatty acid in the brain and eyes and supports healthy infant growth and development

You don't need to be too restrictive when it comes to your diet when breastfeeding

Dietary sources of DHA include fatty fish (anchovies, salmon, tuna, mackerel, halibut) and eggs. The challenge is that The Department of Health recommends limiting fatty fish intake while breastfeeding due to concerns over mercury. The good news is that many post-natal vitamins include DHA. Vitamin D: By helping the body absorb calcium and phosphorus, Vitamin D supports healthy bone development in children. Research also suggests that Vitamin D plays a role in immune health. Sources include fortified milk, salmon, and 15 minutes exposure to sunlight. In addition, your post-natal vitamin should provide Vitamin D. Choline: Choline tends to be one of those nutrients we forget about, but it is so vitally important for breastfeeding women to consume. Our bodies make Choline, but not in sufficient amounts, therefore we have to rely on sources from our diets; but most of us, especially



breastfeeding women, aren't getting enough. Choline is important because it supports the neurocognitive development of infants. It is therefore important for breastfeeding women to consume foods that have a source of Choline in their daily diet. These include beef, eggs, chicken, fish, pork, nuts, legumes and cruciferous vegetables like broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage, or kale.

WHAT FOODS SHOULD YOU AVOID WHILE BREASTFEEDING?

You don't need to be too restrictive when it comes to your diet when breastfeeding, however there are a few things you should be mindful of. Oily fish: You should have no more than two portions of oily fish (e.g. fresh tuna, sardines, mackerel, trout) a week. This is because these contain high levels of mercury, which can damage your baby's developing nervous system. Caffeine: Too much caffeine while breastfeeding can keep your baby awake, or make them unusually fussy, so it is better to limit the number of drinks you have containing caffeine (not only tea and coffee, but also energy drinks). Some cold and flu remedies contain caffeine, and chocolate also contains a substance (theobromine) that is very similar and can produce the same effects.

Alcohol: Alcohol passes to breastfed babies in very small amounts and it is unlikely that having an occasional drink will harm your baby. However, it is sensible to drink very little (no more than one or two units once or twice a week) when you are breastfeeding.
